

Publishing strategy

The names in the book are big in the worlds they inhabit. The author has a large social media presence and is well known in those circles. He also, in my opinion, looks good. A lot of the

	push will be off of star power and the people in the book more than the Dungeons and Dragons content.
What should the cover convey?	The cover should convey a sense of intrigue and curiosity to encourage those who are on the fence to try it. It does also need to convey that the subject matter is greater than simply the cover; that there is something to discover within the book.
Desired response	I want people to see a person on the cover, and ask who is that? Or, I want someone to look at the cover and say what is that? Maybe be able to look at the cover and pick out something after they look a bit longer to push the discovery.
What copy must go on the cover?	Brian W. Foster; Title and subtitle; Do you know there are people who practice magic?; <i>Blackened White</i> has to be one of the more honest books I've ever read; I can't think of someone better to write about these personal stories – Matt Mercer

Thought starters & Ideas for the cover	"The Mask of Many Faces" is an item in DnD and the inspiration for the title. It allows the user to assume the appearance of someone else. As mentioned before, Brian Foster is a selling point and doesn't look too bad as a visual subject. The D20 dice used in Dungeons and Dragons is very recgonisable. The colour combinations used in Between the Sheets are darker colours.
